A note from the Pastor's desk:

Happy October! As I sit here typing these words, I'm thinking about our most recent catechism class. We talked at length about the story of Noah's Ark, and how when it was all over, God promised never again to destroy the earth with a flood. And yet, I'm also listening to the sounds of a steady rain on my window, which will surely increase in intensity as the day wears on. Hurricane Helene is bearing down on the Florida coast at this moment, and areas in the path of this storm are guaranteed a great deal of rain the next two days. In fact, water-related deaths (from storm surge and flash flooding, for example) account for almost 90% of tropical storm and hurricane fatalities in the US.

We know that God isn't going to flood the earth again, but still - why do these catastrophes happen? Where is God in the middle of all this? I would respond by saying that's not how God operates. God doesn't step in to turn aside all potential disasters. God doesn't always prevent the things which cause us pain.

Perhaps a better question would be: What do we do when such calamities occur? What is the Christian response? The answer is we step in to help however we can. We see this in many places in scripture. For one example, we can look at 2 Corinthians. As Paul is traveling around and visiting the various congregations he has planted, he is also asking them for help. The believers in Jerusalem have fallen on hard times, and so Paul is collecting money for them. Paul reassures the Gentile Christians that God sees and rewards such generosity (2 Corinthians 9:6–12).

And so, as the earth turns and disasters continue to strike, let us work together to help those in need, and pray to God to bless our efforts.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



Sara Shealy has been a part of Mt. Hebron for 40+ years. She was born and raised Baptist, attending several different congregations over the years. After marrying her husband Bobby, a member of Mt. Hebron, she continued to attend Beulah Baptist Church for some time before deciding to attend Mt. Hebron.

Over the years, Sara has participated in the life of the church in various ways. Until recently, she served as the weekly bulletin folder. Having served in this capacity for about 20 years, the pastor estimates that Sara folded upwards of 50,000 bulletins!

Sara has many special memories from her time here at Mt. Hebron. Most notably, she fondly remembers when her children were baptized, and watching her children and grandchildren participate in the church. Her favorite part of worship was always listening to the beautiful music and singing the hymns – even though they were different from the hymns she learned as a child in the Baptist church!

Something Sara likes to do for fun is word puzzles! Something interesting you may not know about her is that she used to work as a seamstress. At first, she worked at Old School Sewing Room in Prosperity, moving from the pants department to the jacket department, and finally to the shirt department. Later, she worked at JB Martin. Sara, thank you for the example of faithfulness that you have set for us!

SAINT OF THE MONTH

Teresa of Ávila (birth name Teresa Sánchez de Cepeda Dávila y Ahumada) was born March 28th, 1515 in the Spanish town of Ávila. She was raised in a Christian household. Her mother died when she was eleven, at which point Teresa developed a closer spiritual connection with the Virgin Mary. In 1536, at the age of twenty, she entered the local Carmelite convent.

Not long after becoming a nun, Teresa began to experience visions, which continued for most of her life. She also noticed that her convent and others of the Carmelite order had grown lax. These observations, together with her visions, convinced her to undertake a series of reforms and start her own, stricter convents.

In 1562, Teresa founded her first reformed convent, the Convento de San José in Ávila. Starting in 1567, she began to travel extensively throughout Spain, founding fifteen additional strict convents. Quite often, her work was opposed by political and religious authorities who were skeptical of her reforms and her visions.

During this time, Teresa wrote about her remarkable visions and how she interpreted them. She was concerned with spiritual progression through meditation and prayer, and the soul's ascent to God. In addition to her autobiography, her most prominent works are *The Way of Perfection* and *Interior Castle.*

Rarely slowing down, Teresa founded five convents in the last three years of her life. She died early in the morning on October 15th, 1582, travelling to the city of Alba de Tormes. She was buried in the convent there, which she had founded. The church commemorates her on the day of her death, October 15th.
