A note from the Pastor's desk:

White, green, green, white, blue. Sorry, I was just reminding myself what color the paraments need to be for each Sunday in November. For the altar guild, this time of year can seem a little confusing! That's because one church year is coming to a close, and another one is starting. There are also several holidays thrown into the mix (Reformation, All Saints, and Christ the King Sundays). In general, you might say this is the time of year for both endings and beginnings.

On All Saints' Sunday (November 2nd), we remember our loved ones who have died, whose earthly sojourns have come to a close. The gospel reading on November 9th also deals with the themes of death and resurrection. Death seems like a very definite ending for us. But for them, it is the beginning of their time in God's perpetual care – at rest until that day when the trumpet shall sound, the Lord shall return, and we shall all be changed.

On November 16th – our final "green" Sunday for a while – Jesus speaks in dire tones about the coming destruction of the Temple, wars and insurrections, great earthquakes, famines and plagues, dreadful portents, and signs from heaven. Such signs would seem to indicate that the end of the world is drawing near. But perhaps we should say the end of the world *as we know it,* and the beginning of our Lord's return, along with the complete fulfillment of God's plan for all creation.

On November 23rd, we will celebrate Christ the King Sunday, the final Sunday of the church year. But paradoxically, our gospel reading paints a picture of Jesus hanging on the cross – not an image one would typically expect for a king. For his followers, the crucifixion of Jesus seemed like the end of his ministry. What more could it have been? They would all just have to return to their old lives. Little did they know that it was but the beginning of something completely new. For the kingdom where Jesus would reign is not an earthly one, but rather in our hearts. After his resurrection and ascension, his disciples would go forth to extend that kingdom into all the world.

On November 30th, we will mark the first Sunday of the new church year, and the first Sunday of the season of Advent. The Israelites had been waiting for the Messiah for so long. At the birth of Jesus, their time of waiting was ended. God's visit to earth in human form had begun. We too wait for our Lord to once again come to earth and make all things right.

One theme that is common to all of these Sundays is the need for *hope*. When we see our loved ones die... when we see the innocent being killed... when we see natural disasters, and violence, and death and destruction everywhere we look... we must have hope that things will not stay this way. We must hope that when our Lord returns, the dead will be raised, every tear will be wiped from our eyes, and justice will prevail throughout the earth.

While we wait for these things to happen, we work to usher in the Kingdom of God, in our own little corner of the earth. And we pray, "Thy kingdom come." And we lift up our heads, for "the world is about to turn" (ELW 723).

HURRICANE MELISSA

On Tuesday, October 28th, the island of Jamaica was devastated as Hurricane Melissa came ashore with 175 mph winds. Other countries like Haiti and Cuba were also greatly affected by this storm.

SEPTEMBER FINANCES

In September, the church had contributions to the General Fund totalling \$7,550, ~\$1,300 less than General Fund expenditures for the month. The Maintenance Fund paid \$650 for maintenance work on the fellowship hall, and the other funds had little or no change.

Through September, the church's budgeted amount was \$105,426.00, and the church had expenses of ~\$101,000 – about \$4,400 under budget. This does not include Memorial Fund expenditures.

Overall, the General Fund stands at about \$24,445 behind for the year through September.


We're so grateful for Ahyler's joyful spirit and the energy he brings to Mt. Hebron!

CHURCH HISTORY FROM A TO Z

K is for King Jr., Martin Luther. 20th-century civil rights activist, Baptist minister, martyr. King was born January 15th, 1929, the son and grandson of Baptist ministers. After college and grad school, he served Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama. In 1959, he was called to Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, to serve with his father. He led the civil rights movement until his assassination in Memphis, Tennessee on April 4th, 1968. His faith is what led him to work for equality for African-Americans, and justice for the oppressed.

K is for King James Version, an English translation of the Bible first published in 1611. This translation was authorized by King James I for the Church of England. It included all 66 books of the Bible, plus 14 books from the Apocrypha. Since its publication, the KJV has become one of the most widely read and printed books in all of history – and it is still widely used today. Some people claim that the KJV is superior to all other translations. However, this is a tough case to make, due to the discovery of thousands of manuscripts in the last 400 years, along with advances in the translation of Greek and Hebrew.

K is for Kingdom of God, a phrase used by Jesus in the New Testament. Throughout history, Christians have tried to forge governments and nations where God alone is worshipped, only God's laws are observed, and followers of other religions are excluded. (Other religions have also done likewise.) Such efforts are misguided, since God's kingdom is not of this world (John 18:36). The parables of Jesus paint quite a different picture of the kingdom (see Matthew 13, for example – the "Parable Discourse"). Ultimately, the Kingdom of God is wherever God's love, compassion, justice, and forgiveness are made known to all.
